The findings indicate that despite very rapid population growth, there has been no change in the fraction, or rate, of homelessness since the 2022 PiT count.

Since 2008, the population of Calgary has increased by over 45%. Despite this, the number of people identified as experiencing homelessness in PiT Counts fell by 13% over the same period. In 2008, 3.3 out of every 1,000 Calgarians were counted as homeless, while in 2024, only 2 out of every 1,000 Calgarians were counted. This is a reduction of over 40% since 2008.



OVERVIEW

The Point-in-Time (PiT) Count is a biennial survey that, along with other data sources, provides an overall estimate of the number of individuals experiencing homelessness on a given night. This snapshot offers insight into the state of homelessness by identifying trends that help improve supports and strategies in the homeless-serving sector.

Calgary's PiT Count was on October 10, 2024. Outreach and volunteer-led teams enumerated encampments and coordinated a night count of unsheltered individuals from 8 p.m. to 12 a.m. Other data was collected from homelessserving agencies and systems, with all survey information voluntarily self-reported.

Indigenous children (ages 0-17) are significantly overrepresented, making up approximately 50% of this age group.




